#### CRYSTAL BROOK DOG PARK

Port Pirie Regional Council is creating a new dog park at Crystal Brook — but we need your help. Council is calling on the community, particularly dog owners, to share their priorities for the park so Council can better understand the community's needs.

A disused section of land at the rear of the Crystal Brook Tennis Club (see map) has been identified as suitable for a dog park. \$30,000 has been committed in the 2021/22 budget for establishing this dog park subsequent to involving the community in ascertaining their needs. This is in addition to \$30,000 budgeted to upgrade the existing dog park in Port Pirie following community consultation.

This could include upgrades to existing infrastructure (eg. fencing, lighting) or new ideas (eg. dog exercise equipment, shelter, running track for dog owners).

The intention is to create a Master Plan and take a staged approach, performing some of the works in 2021-22 and seeking further funding to complete the works in future years. We would love to know what you would like to see in a dog park. Is it lighting, shelter, dog exercise equipment or perhaps something outside the box?

Maxine has been instrumental in raising a significant amount of funds for the Crystal Brook RSL Club whilst at the same time supporting our local veterans and their families. Maxine has committed to a lifetime of serving the local community in so many ways.

The Event of the Year, the Crystal Brook Netball Club Debutante Ball was received by Carly Pavy (Vice President Netball Club), Bronny Perry and Julie Fogarty. Carly acknowledged and thanked the many contributors that had made this event a success in particular Bronny and Julie (Debutante Trainers), Ashleigh Lynch and Emma Grossman. The event saw 10 young Debutantes and their partners be presented to local footballer Campbell Coombe in front of 240 who attended the evening. Carly emphasised that this event not only raises vital funds for the club but that it is a great tradition that continues to bring together young people from Crystal Brook and the surrounding regions.

#### Out and About from the Brook

#### Water Sources - Natural and Man-made

Follow the Goyder Highway, (B64) through Narridy and Gulnare towards Spalding. After crossing Bundaleer Creek, turn sharp left at the pumping station on to Bundaleer Rd (unsealed). The historic Bundaleer Stud shearing shed is on your right. At the 'Y' junction, keep left, crossing the cattle grid, now Wheal Sarah Road, until the Water Aqueduct comes into view. Walk up the slope on the left side a short distance for great views. The aqueduct was opened in 1903 and is 152 m. long and 16 m. high. Nearby are some signs of old mining works. Three lodes of good quality copper were discovered here in 1858 and men from Burra set up the Wheal Sarah Mining Company. Shafts up to 70 m were sunk and 33 tons of copper, about 60% pure, were obtained by 1859.


Return to 'Y' junction, turn sharp left up the embankment to a reservoir viewing area. The reservoir was built to supply water to Port Pirie, Snowtown, Brinkworth and Blyth. Return to the Goyder Highway, (B64) turning left up and over the pass where there is another viewing area at the top of a rise. Then follow the signs to Spalding and lunch?

On R. M. Williams Way, (signs), continue south a short distance, then turn left into Edward Lunn Drive, over the Broughton River using the old bridge viewing area. Back to R. M. Williams Way, over the newer bridge then next right (unsealed) on to Broughton River Valley Road, then over the Hutt River Bridge at the junction with the Broughton River (very photographic). Eyre's Monument, (rocky outcrop) can be seen to your right, past the quarry. At the next 'T' junction, Frome Crossing Road, turn right across the river, (water crossing), returning to Goyder Highway, (B64), turning left return to Crystal Brook. This tour is recommended for vehicles with high

#### Crystal Brook Shopfront & Lighting Improvements

Port Pirie Regional Council is putting the finishing touches on the upgrade of Bowman Street, Crystal Brook.

Seventeen businesses and commercial property owners have collaborated with Council to enhance their street appeal through the Crystal Brook Shopfront Improvement Project. The project was funded through \$235,000 from the Federal Government's Drought Communities Programme.

These shopfront building improvements are underway and include repairs, modifications, replacement, painting and signwriting to the parapets, verandas and shopfront facades of the nominated businesses.

The enhanced shopfronts will not only provide an economic and aesthetic boost to the individual businesses, but will also contribute to a revitalised streetscape.

In addition to this, Council has installed heritage solar lights each crossing. Community consultation identified the desire for heritage lights and street furniture as part of the Bowman Street upgrade. The new solar lights contribute towards this vision along with heritage bollards and seating.




